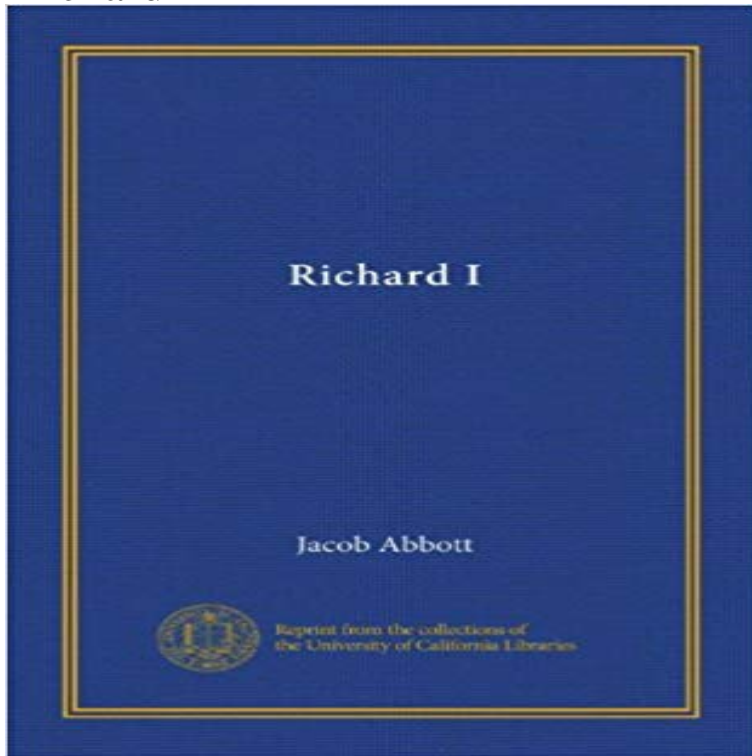


Richard I
