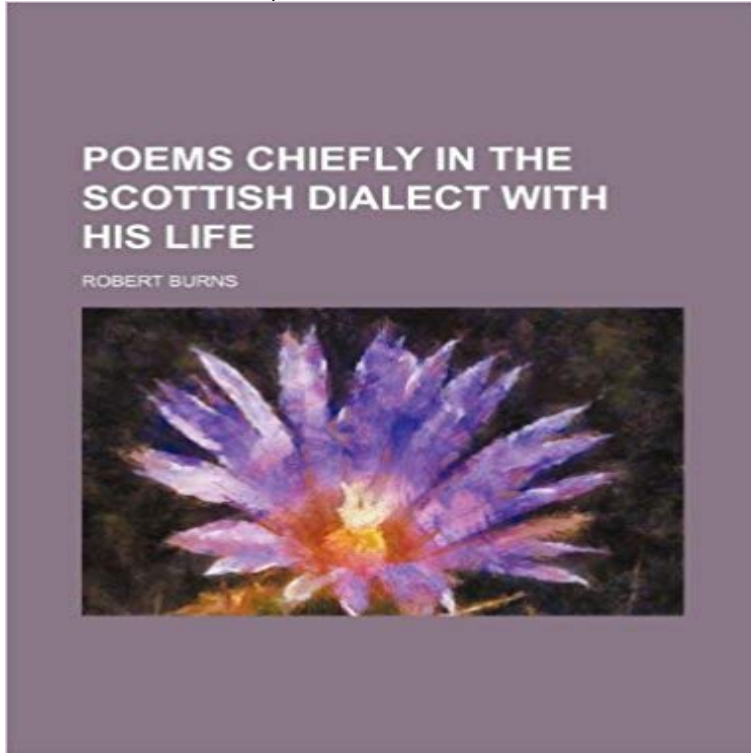


Poems chiefly in the scottish dialect with his life
